They are native to Southeast Queensland and Northern New South Wales and carry high levels of DHA (di-hydroxylacetate), which can provide high quality medicinal honey e.g. Manuka Honey.

Many of our members have bought and planted the species that I have propagated, and now I have surplus stocks that I can offer to the members of other Beekeeping Associations.

Some of the varieties that I have on hand include: *Polygalifolium* – Wild May, Jelly Bush, Yellow Tea Tree; *Scoparium* – Manuka, Red Tea Tree, Kahikatoa; *Petersonnii* – Lemon Scented Tea Tree.
